




eBook Program



It's difficult to imagine that anyone employed in education has a more rewarding position than that of a school librarian. Who wouldn't want to assist staff members, promote amazing literature, and watch students learn and grow over multiple years? The downside of this fantastic profession is that often the role of the school librarian is misunderstood or undervalued within the larger educational community. Advocacy for school librarian positions and the importance of effective library programs is crucial for the continued success of our students.

Although the need for library advocacy will not disappear, it is the hope of the SLAWNY advocacy group that we no longer feel alone in our efforts. There are four scheduled meetings on the calendar for 2021. The purpose of each meeting is to connect with others in the school library community to discuss advocacy strategies and put plans into action.

January 2021 will offer two scheduled advocacy sessions. On January 7th, Jen Park, Matthew Park, and Dawn Zeig will be presenting their session entitled "Seen But Not Read: Advocating for (School) Libraries."
